CANCELLED Team

The **CANCELLED Arts Programme** is part of an ongoing international artist-led inquiry by *Empathy & Risk.*

Empathy & Risk was born out of the conviction that the capacity of the arts to effectively influence policy development has not been systematically explored. Empathy & Risk hopes to address this by engaging artists with policy makers and communities experiencing conflict, in order to address the placement of empathy in individual and policy responses to threat.

Empathy & Risk was conceptualised by David Cotterrell and Ruwanthie de Chickera in 2015. Since then, it has been active in the UK, Sri Lanka, Rwanda, Pakistan and Palestine.

The work of *Empathy & Risk* involves independent research, artistic responses, interventions into government and institutional policy making, writing,

advocating and documenting of inquiries into areas of empathetic failure and escalating risk.

Empathy & Risk looks for opportunities to consolidate the languages of art, advocacy and academia, in order to undermine the hierarchies of knowledge between these disciplines and introduce persons working within these sectors, to parallel understandings of common issues.

As such, when in 2018, the **Institute of Statelessness and Inclusion** initiated conversations on the need to build long-term partnerships between artists and activists in the area of Statelessness, **Empathy & Risk** were inspired by this challenge.

The **CANCELLED Arts Programme** grew out of this opportunity.



The **CANCELLED Arts Programme** is devised by *Empathy & Risk* as a co-curated, artistled, interdisciplinary initiative. The project is being curated in collaboration with **Creative Court** and involves established and emerging practitioners willing to critically reflect on political challenges and the role of their practices within society.

Creative Court

Creative Court has been working on artistic installations related to statelessness for 5 years now. In 2020, a new exhibition on statelessness in Europe is expected to be launched in The Hague. For this 2019 conference, Creative Court has joined the teams of the Institute of Statelessness and Inclusion and Empathy & Risk with the intent to inspire and be inspired, while connecting the conference and the city.

Concepts of international law and democracy are always developing, one may wonder if they will ever be fully perfect. **Creative Court** develops art projects and reflects on global justice. They believe that it is quite impossible to achieve lasting peace simply through rules and regulations. True peace can only be found through our shared humanity.

Creative Court strives to be a leading source of inspiration for human consciousness and connection. They work from the understanding that empathy and reflection are vital characteristics for peaceful coexistence, and that art has the ability to incite these qualities. Exploring humanity and the systems humanity creates in response to inhumanity, Creative Court develops concepts, conducts artistic research and presents education programmes.

In their work, **Creative Court** collaborates with international artists, curators, journalists, scientists, and many others. Quality, imaginative power and accessibility are key to their work. **Creative Court** is based in The Hague, seat of the Dutch government and city of peace and justice.



The Institute on Statelessness and Inclusion promotes inclusive societies by realising and protecting the right to a nationality for all. ISI is the first and only human rights NGO dedicated to working on this issue at a global level and has emerged as the civil society focal point for the statelessness movement.

As an NGO, **ISI** places significant value on working with artists, and on seeking meaningful resolutions to statelessness which go beyond the mere granting of nationality and focus on inclusion of stateless and formerly stateless persons in society.

The CANCELLED Arts Programme benefits from the tripartite collaboration of the three partner organisations – *Empathy & Risk*, Institute of Statelessness and Inclusion and Creative Court.

CANCELLED Arts Programme

CANCELLED will present new artworks, initiate a global archive on existing art on Statelessness and open up the conference as a site for artistic intervention and critique.

The CANCELLED Arts Programme comprises five main sections:

CANCELLEDPlatform

New artwork created by research-led artists informed through conversations with delegates participating in the conference.

CANCELLED Archive Cross section of seminal artworks on Statelessness sourced from artists working around the world.

Available on a virtual platform and featured within the conference.

CANCELLED Experiment

Discrete artist interventions challenging the structure, process and programming of the conference.

CANCELLED Dialogues

Artist-led interdisciplinary discussions and debates on the subject of Statelessness.

CANCELLED Bridge

Art-related events connecting the closed conference to the city of The Hague and vice versa.

The arts are frequently seen as instruments for project delivery. The arts are rarely deployed as an investigatory tool. Culture is often deployed to assist with increasing the impact of solutions, but not commonly seen as a method by which the questions can be articulated. The searching, questioning investigative methodology of independent artists is rarely effectively harnessed within the analysis of context.

Partners

As part of the process towards creating new work, the Platform Artists were partnered with conference delegates. Here are the artists-delegate partnerships that were set up.

Deepti Gurung & Neha Gurung I Nepal Neha was stateless in Nepal because her mother Deepti couldn't pass her citizenship onto her. The ISI book on Statelessness for Children was inspired by Neha.

And **Ralph Eya** - An independent art practitioner concentrating on socially engaged art projects.

Jawad Fairooz | Bahrain

A former Bahraini MP, made stateless after opposing the government. He is now the Chairman of Salam for Democracy and Human Rights.

And **Rana Bishara** - An installation and performing artist. Her motives and symbols are connected to the memory, identity and heritage of Palestine.

Liesl Muller | South Africa Liesl was admitted as an attorney of the High Court of South Africa in 2011 and has been working on statelessness since 2013. Liesl specialises in nationality law.

And **Rabaâ Benlahbib** - The founder and director of the arts initiative Creative Court in The Hague.

Cynthia Orchard | UK

A human rights lawyer specialising in asylum and statelessness policy. She is on the Advisory Committee of the European Network on Statelessness.

And **Stephen Stenning** – Head of British Council's Arts and Society work, a cross-disciplinary role that uses cultural approaches to global challenges.

Ravi Hemadri

A social activist with over 25 years of experience in research and advocacy on the rights of Adivasis, Dalits, women, migrants and refugees.

And **Manish Harijan** - An artist-inexile from Nepal. Manish has not been accepted for exhibition in Nepal since his 2012 solo show in Katmandu.

John Packer

Neuberger-Jesin Professor of International Conflict Resolution in the Faculty of Law, and Director of the Human Rights Research and Education Centre, Ottawa University.

And **David Cotterrell** – Installation artist working across media and technologies. Co-founder of Empathy & Risk.

CANCELLED Dialogues

The CANCELLED Dialogues are curated conversations that will take place as key events within the conference. They are interdisciplinary, non-hierarchical conversations convened by artists in response to an artwork or a social intervention of relevance.

The CANCELLED Dialogues, part of the CANCELLED Arts Programme, will be the third set of dialogues under the Empathy & Risk Dialogues series. The first Empathy & Risk Dialogues were the WAR Dialogues, held in Edinburgh during the Edinburgh International Festival in 2017; the second Empathy & Risk Dialogues were titled the MEMORY Dialogues and were held in Rwanda in 2018 as part of the Ubumuntu Festival of Humanity.
